# Fall 2024 Courses

### 1. LABRST193|Labour Studies Theory (Part 1)

One of our foundational courses (you must take part 1 or 2 to obtain the certificate). Our theory courses develop critical thinking skills to be a better 'big picture' activist by connecting the dots between everyday problems workers face on the job and the larger unseen forces that cause them. Who are the 1%? What is capitalism? How do employers squeeze workers on the job? Why are corporate profits so high while workers' living standards are decreasing? Can workers and unions fight this?

### 2. LABRST 205|What are worker co-operatives?

Workers have a long history and tradition of worker owned and run business', apartment complexes, stores, credit unions and other enterprises. These co-ops are run democratically by the people who work in them, and the profits go to workers rather than a private employer. Interest in co-operative ownership as an alternative has grown recently. Can co-ops improve workers' lives? How do they work, and what are some examples today? What challenges do they face?

### 3. LABRST 206 Challenges facing the labour movement

This course outlines the gradual attacks on public sector unions around the country, especially in Alberta, where governments have taken aim at the bargaining rights of the province's public sector. We then look at how a union local in Alberta developed an exciting 'take back the shop floor' training seminar to mobilize union members in the workplace to build their power and confidence to fight back. Can similar mobilization strategies be adopted around the country by other unions?

### 4. LABRST 207 | Issues in labour law for workers

The theme of this course: The Occupational Health and Safety System: Profits over Safety?' The OHS system has made workplaces safer and healthier. However, does it put employer profits or efficiency over workers health and safety? Is it designed to steer workers away from H and S activism and into following employer procedures? Does it blame workers for poor health and safety? Were employer profits put ahead of worker H & S during covid? How can unions put workers' experiences and voices at the centre of safe and healthy workplaces? .

1.LABRST 204 | Labour History (part 1)

Learn and discuss the exciting and heroic history of how Canadian workers fought for better workplaces and a better society. How did employers and governments use violence against workers who tried to build unions? How were company spies, and private security agencies used against workers who wanted unions? What gains did the labour movement win for working people? How can we use knowledge about labour's past to improve workplaces and society today?

### 2. LABRST204|Challenges facing the Labour Movement (part 2)

### 3. LABRST194|Labour Law for Workers (Part 4)

Note: you do not have to take parts 1 or 2 to enroll. This course will look at increasingly complicated workplace problems in the unionized environment such as illness, addiction and absenteeism in the workplace; Discipline and discharge in union and non-union workplaces, employers increasing use of technology for surveillance and making jobs redundant, and other contemporary workplace issues.
